Our students have all worked very hard and should be very proud of their accomplishments. School reports, NAPLAN results and different assessments, all demonstrate the learning growth that everyone here has achieved. Among the most-improved in 2023 was Lucindale Area School, which has fewer than 200 students. It ranked 17th out of the top 20 schools for year 5 results." - The Advertiser.

This year we welcomed new Reception students to a big school, saw outstanding commitment to learning across all years and celebrated the graduation of another cohort of Year 12s. Earlier in the year we had 70 students from Years 3-11 participate in the Australian Mathematics Competition and several students recognised as having achieved Credits and Distinctions. Ms Rivett's Year 5 and 6 class participated in a sustainability competition and had great success with Samantha Keifel winning the overall prize for South Australia and winning the school a 3D printer. Presentation Night was an opportunity for us to celebrate our students, with several young people being awarded subject awards and scholarships.

Our students have excelled not only academically but also in various extracurricular activities. Our show teams competed at the Adelaide and Mount Gambier shows in Goats, Rams and Cattle achieving fantastic results and representing Lucindale Area School with pride. We had a number of outstanding sporting achievements with our engagement in extracurricular sport being driven by our superstar PE teacher, Alisha Rothall and parents alike.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge our hardworking teachers, admin, support staff and leadership, who also faced challenges. Lucindale Area School are so very fortunate to have a team of staff whose priority is always to ensure that our students have the best learning environment to succeed and this remained central to every decision that was made. This year we farewelled a number of staff including our Principal, Adrian Maywald. For the past 11 years, Adrian has supported the growth and development of the School, Farm, and Boarding program.

This year our Parents and Friends Association provided us support in our inaugural Grandparents and Grandfriends day which saw over 80 special family members visit our school and share in student learning. Students had a wonderful afternoon running through rainbow clouds and spending time with each other. We would like to thank parents who have volunteered in the Canteen this year. Running the canteen is an enormous task and we encourage any future volunteers in 2024.

This year we have seen the commencement of the upgrade to the front of school, a project that will advance in leaps and bounds over the summer break. In the Primary School we have seen the upgrade of the interactive whiteboards which have been used extensively already by our Primary teachers and students. 2024 Leadership – Adam Box (Education Director)





YEAR 8 SCIENCE

For Science, the Year 8 class participated in an industry collaboration with Struan Research Centre. Students participated in a farm tour in which they were posed industry problems. These were focused on yard design, animal temperament, irrigation, land restoration and shearing shed design.

Throughout the term, students conducted research, drawing on both primary and secondary sources. They then designed industry solutions and presented them back to Megan Willis, a researcher and PhD candidate at Struan. The Year 8 class conducted their research and presentations in a professional manner and should be commended on their efforts.











PRIMARY INTERACTIVE BOARDS

This term, the Primary Building was busy with an exciting development, an update to our classroom technology. The technology in the Primary Building was outdated and no longer conducive to the teaching and student learning environments. After a lot of research from the school's IT department, Promethean interactive panels were chosen as the best fit for our classrooms.



The school has acknowledged this contribution by placing plaques next to each of the interactive panels. Lucindale Lions President, Mr Bob Crosby visited the school and had photos with classes to mark this generous contribution. He was presented with cards from the students to pass on our gratitude to the Lions members.

The R/1 Class has utilised their Promethean interactive panel during Literacy and Numeracy for building understanding through teacher instruction, classroom discussions and game-based activities. Students are more engaged in InitiaLit sessions due to the high quality of the new screen and the speed of programs working instantly.

The 3/4 and 5/6 Class have already put the Promethean interactive panel to good use. Students are eager to share work by writing on the digital whiteboard and watch avidly for their name to be chosen on the digital spinner. Students are finding the new screen easier to read and the features easy to use. Games, teacher presentations and displaying student work on the board are just the start for our use of this new technology.
















RECEPTION / YEAR 1 AG

CERAMICS WITH THE YEAR 9'S

Year 9 students have been completing a unit in Ceramics in Art. Students have been learning about 4 different types of clay, their blends and purposes being sculptural or functional. Different clays were put to use to create wheel thrown vessels on a pottery wheel, coil and slab hand built items and discussions around glaze versus paint as a finishing process. Students have also learnt a three part glaze application and the value of a mid fire clay versus natural clay abstracted from the ground.











INDIGENOUS GARDEN DEVELOPMENT— UPDATE

Students from the Year 9 class have mentored some younger levels assisting them in their imprinting and making tiles. As the tiles dry we have started on the glazing process. The Earthenware clay chosen is a dark blend of sand and ground mud oxides that is a durable material if high fired. Its also a great clay for students as it holds itself up well for sculptural projects and there is less chance of kiln failures and excess waste. Students have been learning about underglazes, engobes and use of stains as a first application onto a raw dry surface. As a second glazing process students have been applying clear mid fire gloss that will once fired be glossy. Other glazes have been a mixture of various ingredients providing a variety of natural shades. The next process that students have been helping with is kiln stacking, preparing kiln shelves with kiln wash and measuring kiln furniture in height and width. Discussion and length of a firing, changes in temperature and weather all have impacts on success and clay shrinkage have been topics of discussion. Hopefully the kiln will be fired in the next few weeks.

School Library News


