STAGE 1 MATHEMATICS

Throughout this term, the Stage 1
Essential Mathematics Class has been exploring data in real-life contexts. They were given the challenge of exploring methods to achieve consistency in baking. In groups, they used different strategies (measuring cups, piping bags and scales) to try and achieve the most consistent chocolate muffins. They then measured the spread, height and weight of each muffin to complete a data analysis using box plots and determine the best technique!



RECEPTION LITERACY

The Receptions are busily working hard to understand different aspects of written and oral language.

Every morning, we complete daily Phonemic Awareness, understanding that spoken words are made up of individual sounds, called phonemes.

Phonemic Awareness:

- Focus is on sounds
- Deals with spoken language
- Lessons are auditory
- · Students work with manipulating sounds and sounds in words

So far this term we have covered:

Rhyming - hearing rhymes, rhyme recognition, rhyme production
Onset fluency – consonants
Blending – compound words, syllables, body-coda
Final/Medial Sounds – final sounds
Segmenting – compound words, syllables, onset-rime
Adding – words to make compound words, syllables
Deleting – compound words, syllables
Substituting – compound words, syllables
Letter naming – consonants and vowels
Language Awareness – repeating sentences and counting words

Week 7, saw us begin our InitiaLit program – a whole-class initial instruction in literacy.

InitiaLit incldues an explicit and systematic synthetic phonics program as well as a literature component to enrich oral language, listening comprehension and vocabulary. Five key components: phonemic awareness (as well as Heggerty), phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. Phonics:

- Focus on graphemes or letters and corresponding sounds
- Deals with written language and print
- Lessons are visual and auditory
- Students work with reading and writing letters according to sounds, spelling patterns and phonological structure

The first 12 lessons are designed to be playful, but purposeful as children learn about spoken and printed words and sounds within words.

From Lesson 13, children are introduced to a new sound and its corresponding letter. Special care is taken to teach the link between sound and letter explicitly.

The Australian Curriculum: English aims to ensure that students:

Learn to listen to, read, view, speak, write, create and reflect on increasingly complex and sophisticated spoken, written and multimodal texts across a growing range of contexts with accuracy, fluency and purpose.

In Year 7/8 students are currently studying **Advertising**. They are soon to start the novel study Tomorrow, When The War Began.

In Year 9 students are currently studying **A Hero's Journey** and will be creating their own storyboard of their narrative.

In Year 10 students are analysing **Documentaries**

Year 11 Essential English film study is The Black Balloon while Year 11 English are studying **Poetry**.

Year 12 Essential English and General English are both studying The Turning.

Did you know?


- · Nearly half (49 per cent) of Australians were born overseas or have at least one parent who was.


